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Locally, retailers had a good holiday

People were out and shopping, but they were smart with their money

Shoppers appeared to be in the mood for bargains but were not deterred from buying by the sluggish economy, according to local retailers.

Mike Husar, one of the owners of Husar's House of Fine Diamonds in West Bend, said he noticed significantly increased foot traffic at his location downtown, but noted that customers were spending less per person.

"I consider it a huge victory that we had a larger traffic count than in previous years," Husar said. "That means people are out and shopping, and aware of our business. People are out there; they're just being a little more frugal. It looks to me like we've hit bottom and are slowly turning around. Time will tell."

Another local jeweler, Koehn and Koehn, reported a strong holiday season, thanks largely to two of its stronger brands, Pandora and Hearts on Fire.

"We had a good holiday season," Andy Koehn said. "We keep in contact with our customers throughout the year in the hopes that if the need arises, they think of us. Our traffic was way up."

Koehn said his store didn't suffer any significant drops in business in 2008, noting that December of that year helped the company recover from a

tough November.

"In our area, we don't have the high highs or the low lows," he said. "We're pretty stable here."

Nationally, holiday shoppers spent a little more this season, according to data released Monday, giving merchants some reason for cheer.

The spending bounce means retailers managed to avoid a repeat of last year's disaster even amid tight credit and double-digit unemployment. Profits should be healthy.

Church prays for thief who took safe

Theft discovered the day after Christmas

Parishioners at St. John's Lutheran Church in Jackson prayed on Sunday for the person who stole from them on Saturday.

"We prayed for the thief because they (most likely) have some kind of financial problem or addiction they need to get help for," said pastor Paul Mittermaier.

A safe — which contained a small amount of cash and documents — was discovered missing from the church, 2881 Division Road, on the day after Christmas.

"We think it happened in the early hours of the 26th, because of the tracks in the snow. It's very disheartening," said Mittermaier. "We have an inkling it's somebody we're acquainted with or someone in the neighborhood that has a need for cash and feel like they can't come forward, maybe a problem with gambling or drugs. Otherwise, we would help someone out if they're in a financial bind."

There was no forced entry, and Mittermaier said the loss of the money is not his biggest concern.

"The most important contents of the safe are the records. We would really like to have those returned or dropped off somewhere where they can be discovered," Mittermaier said.

Those documents — including baptism, confirmation, wedding and burial records and a few legal documents — are of great importance to the church but would have no use to whoever took them, Mittermaier said.

The 40-year-old safe was a small, gray floor model that weighs between 150 and 200 pounds, and is approximately 2 feet tall and 20 inches wide.

Washington County Sheriff's Sgt. Randy Boudry said the department is investigating the crime.

Airlines take another punch

Security crackdown makes for longer check-ins at airports

The airline industry, already crippled by a poor economy and winter storms, has taken yet another hit.

Umar Farouk Abdulmutallab, 23, a Nigerian national, allegedly boarded Northwest Airlines Flight 253 in Amsterdam, Netherlands, on Christmas Eve with an explosive device attached to his body. Slightly before the flight landed in Detroit, Abdulmutallab allegedly set off the device, causing a fire and possible explosion on the aircraft. The heroic flight crew along with passengers restrained him, and he was taken into custody by American law enforcement agents in Detroit, where the flight landed, according to a U.S. Dept. of Justice press release.

The repercussions of Abdulmutallab's alleged terrorist act are being felt across the world, and Washington County is no exception. Both domestic and international travelers, including those traveling through Milwaukee's Mitchell International Airport, can expect to see many new security changes.

Peggy Fischer, owner of Shooting Star Travel in West Bend, said that while she has not received any cancellations as a result of the attempted terrorist attack, she has received a number of complaints from clients regarding the

In airports, confusion reigns

CHICAGO (AP) — You are now free to move about the cabin. Or not.

After a two-day security clampdown prompted by a thwarted attempt to bomb a jetliner, some airline officials told The Associated Press that the in-flight restrictions had been eased. And it was now up to captains on each flight to decide whether passengers can have blankets and other items on their laps or can move around during the final phase of flight.

Confused? So were scores of passengers who flew Monday on one of the busiest travel days of the year. On some flights, passengers were told to keep their hands visible and not to listen to iPods. Even babies were frisked. But on other planes, security appeared no tighter than usual.

The Transportation Security Administration did little to explain the rules.

new security measures.

"Clients have not called and said they are afraid to fly — there is no fear — it is more aggravation that it will take them even longer to check in at the airport," Fischer said.

West Bend travel agent Larry Miller, whose wife owns Lynn Miller Travel, said that he spoke to several of his clients, including six couples presently traveling in the Caribbean.

"All six couples said they did not notice anything in particular (regarding increased security) that would cause

And that inconsistency might well have been deliberate: What's confusing to passengers is also confusing to potential terrorists.

"It keeps them guessing," transportation expert Joseph Schwieterman said.

By not making public a point-by-point list of new security rules, federal officials also retain more flexibility, the DePaul University professor added, enabling them to target responses to certain airports or flights seen as more vulnerable.

"There was criticism after 9-11 that rules could be way too cookbook — not allowing authorities to adapt them to different settings, to different airports," Schwieterman said.

If the objective was to befuddle, then on Monday it was mission accomplished.

New security measures

For domestic travel

"Additional screening measures including explosive detection canine teams, law enforcement officers, gate screening, behavior detection and other measures both seen and unseen. Passengers should not expect to see the same thing at every airport," according to the Transportation Security Administration.

For international travel

"Passengers flying into the United States from abroad can expect to see additional security measures at international airports such as increased gate screening including pat-downs and bag searches. During flight, passengers will be asked to follow flight crew instructions, such as stowing personal items, turning off electronic equipment and remaining seated during certain portions of the flight," according to the TSA.

Passengers on U.S. bound international flights will not be allowed to move about the cabin (including going to the bathroom), access their carry-on bags, or use blankets or pillows for the final 60 minutes of flight, according to the New York Times.

extra delays — which kind of surprised me that they got through security at (Chicago) O'Hare quite easily," Miller said.

ier, too, because stores had a year to plan their inventories to match consumer demand and never needed to resort to fire-sale clearances.

Retail sales rose 3.6 percent from Nov. 1 through Dec. 24, compared with a 2.3 percent drop in the year-ago period, according to figures from MasterCard Advisors' SpendingPulse, which tracks all forms of payment, including cash.

Adjusting for an extra shopping day between Thanksgiving and Christmas, the number was closer to a 1 percent gain.

Last year, the economy was in "critical condition," said Michael McNamara, vice president at MasterCard Advisors' SpendingPulse. "This year, it's in stable condition."

One retailer that reported a banner holiday season was Camera Case, a US Cellular retailer with shops in Hartford, West Bend and Kewaskum. Regional manager Mike Brunette said his company's strong showing was the result of US Cellular's four-day promotion that began on Nov. 27, "Black Friday," where every phone they sold was free after a rebate.

"The response was overwhelming," Brunette said. "I've been doing this a long time and I've never seen anything like it. Virtually every store had lines of people the whole time they were open."

That sale may have stolen a little of the thunder from the rest of the season, but Brunette is pleased with what it produced.

"Those four days allowed us to exceed our numbers from last year," Brunette said. "Not everybody is in a position to say that."

One of those is Bergmann's TV and Appliance in Slinger. Salesman Sam Abraham said his business was a little slower than last year.

"We did notice, on average, people would step down a model from the high-end model," Abraham said.

The decrease in sales wasn't a surprise to Abraham.

"It just happened," he said. "We always try to look on the positive side. What might have helped us is we have our own service department, so we have a lot of repeat customers."

tipped off by the alleged terrorist's own father and failed to act, according to Miller.

"Someone's head is going to roll for this," Miller said.

Miller strongly encourages travelers to get to the airport earlier than they have in the past to avoid missing any flights and/or connections.

Barbara Schumacher, owner of Travel on South Main in West Bend, said that at this point in time, she has not received any cancellations as a result of the attempted terrorist attack and new security rules.

"There has been no immediate impact," she said. "(However) whether or not people will choose not to fly in the future remains to be seen."

Mary Ross, owner of Countryside Travel in Hartford, said that to date she has not received any calls regarding the incident in Detroit, nor has Tonya Lueneburg manager of Saga Travel, Ltd. in Hartford.

As a result of the attempted terror attack on Dec. 25, airline stocks have fallen sharply. Delta (Northwest Airline's

parent company) shares fell 4 percent, and American Airlines' AMR Corp. stock fell in excess of 3 percent, along with several other airline stocks.

While on vacation with his family in Hawaii, President Obama chose not to increase the nation's threat level and deferred the decision to Janet Ann Napolitano, U.S. Secretary of Homeland Security, according to The Washington Post.

The FBI, U.S. Customs and Border Protection, and the Joint Terrorism Task Force are investigating the attempted terrorist attack on Dec. 25 in Detroit.

"Had this alleged plot to destroy an airplane been successful, scores of innocent people would have been killed or injured. We will continue to investigate this matter vigorously, and we will use all measures available to our government to ensure that anyone responsible for this attempted attack is brought to justice," Attorney General Eric Holder said in the press release.
