Suspects 'picked the wrong shed'

Prince George's officer holds trio at gunpoint

Two of the men arrested March 14 after a Prince George's County Police officer found them allegedly trying to break into his shed in Owings. The officer followed them from his property and held them at gunpoint until local police arrived.

When breaking into someone else's shed, it's best to be sure the shed in question doesn't belong to a police officer. Calvert County resident, Cpl. Davis of the Prince George's Police Department, held three men at gunpoint after they tried to break into his shed in Owings, according to court documents.

"They picked the wrong shed to break into," Dfc. Richard A. Figueiras of the Calvert County Sheriff's Office said.

Tfc. White and Tpr. Chirichella of the Maryland State Police and Figueiras responded to the call at 6:08 p.m. on March 14.

Davis saw the three men walking by his residence near the woods. The men were looking suspicious, police said.

The men then walked along Davis's property, and were looking around to see if anyone was watching them, according to police.

Shortly thereafter, Davis saw someone later identified as Justin Samuel Teague, 19, of Chesapeake Beach with one hand on the door handle to his shed attempting to enter it. Cpl. Davis then asked the boys what they were doing and they ran into the woods, police said. Teague, Bryan Anthony Wood, 18, of Dunkirk and Christopher Glenn Colevas, 19, of Owings then allegedly decided to flee in their 1991 maroon Jeep Comanche truck. Davis followed them and was able to detain the three boys at gunpoint, at the stop light on Cox Road and northbound Route 4, until the sheriff's office and MSP could arrive on the scene. Davis said he still feels safe in Calvert County. "Calvert County is pretty quiet ... they protect their citizens. I chose Calvert because the quality of people that are down here," Davis said.

Teague has been formally charged with fourth degree burglary, and trespassing on private property.

His two alleged accomplices said they were off-roading and claimed to just look into Davis's shed, according to court documents.

They have not yet been charged according to court documents.
